Welcome



As the first post-Covid year draws to a close it seems fitting to take stock on all the various achievements and opportunities available to the boys of St Anthony's. Ours is a remarkably kind and caring community evidenced in everyday interactions amongst the boys or between boys and staff, or in set piece charitable events that have raised thousands of pounds for those in great need. 'Looking out' for one another is an undeniably beautiful feature of St Anthony's boys and is a reminder to us all of the things in life that really matter most of all which is centred on a relationship with Almighty God manifested in relationship with those around us.

The academic changes include the introduction of Faculties which replaced individual departments. Faculty Heads have assumed oversight of the curriculum from Reception all the way up to Year 8 and their devising of Curriculum Maps has led to greater academic coherence rooted in knowledge, skills and understanding. The mantra is now to 'Teach Up' with a view to raising boys' expectations and fostering thinking skills through questioning and structured debate. The circulation of half-term grades or 'Learning Snapshots' means that throughout the year parents are never more than three weeks away from a formal teacher assessment. Away from the classroom much

attention has been given over to promoting teachers' development, including acquiring new skills as in the digital realm, and the sharing of good practice. Regular learning walks and lesson observations indicate that pupil outcomes are improving. Further evidence might be garnered from the increased number of offers from competitive senior schools.

Boys from all year groups have enjoyed going on trips and visits to diverse places such as the Roman Museum. the British Museum and Library, Bletchley Park, Kew Gardens, the Royal Academy, the Globe, the Cartoon Museum and many more. In fact the total number of trips this year just closed is not far off fifty. The co-curricular programme has been extended to include robotics, coding, debating and public speaking and dance, in addition to favourites such as chess, basketball and playground games. St Anthony's remains a formidable force in competitive games fixtures with strong performances in football, rugby, cricket and hockey. The first 'friendly' debating competition took place against The Hall and Year 6 boys did a sterling job against Year 8 Hall boys in The Junior Challenge. Chess is also becoming more prominent with participation in local and regional tournaments.

The first in a series of special lectures took place earlier this term when Dr Ludivine Broch, Lecturer in Modern History at Westminster University, spoke to all Year 5 – 8 boys about the historical context behind the war in Ukraine. The scope and volume of boys' questions indicated the level of interest in history and current affairs

and Ludivine was struck by their insight and comprehension of quite difficult concepts. In the autumn the school will welcome Professor Lord (Robert) Winston, two other Professors in Classics and History, and a Dominican Friar, which means there is plenty both in and out of the classroom to keep the boys intellectually stimulated.

English


In English we have explored different genres of text such as nonsense poetry, non-fiction, and narrative linked to our geography topic.

First, we looked at The Lonely Beast, a story about a beast who went on a difficult journey to find a friend. We acted out the story and wrote newspaper reports about the beast arriving in the city.



After this we linked our Science and English learning together to read and create information reports about Trees. This was supported by a fun trip to Hampstead Heath to spot evergreen and deciduous trees. Our final topic for the year was centred on coasts, where we explored poetry and stories linked to this theme.





Humanities

Learning about Queen Elizabeth and the Platinum Jubilee was a wonderful highlight of this term. In our lessons, we worked on sequencing key events of her reign on a timeline as well as understanding the roles and responsibilities of a monarch. Our special Junior House jubilee party in the playground brought all our learning to life and was such a memorable event.







Art & DT

Our unit on block printing was lots of fun and we learnt new skills. Inspired by the work of David Weidman we learnt how to monoprint, using acrylic paint and brayers. We created ideas board around the theme of plants and nature, zooming into different parts of a plant. Then we selected one of our designs to carve out into a Styrofoam block.

It was cool to see our prints in action once we rolled out the paint.

Alongside our learning about the British seaside, we learnt about different ways to have fun at the coast, one of them being Punch & Judy puppet shows. After watching a very funny performance online, we set about designing our puppet theatres. Using recycled cereal boxes, we created amazing puppet theatres which we painted and decorated. We also created stick puppets of typical Punch and Judy characters; some even chose to make a sausages puppet just like the original show!










Pirates vs Mermen

Maths

We have covered many different aspects of Maths over the year. We started the year by re-capping our knowledge of addition and subtraction. We then progressed to learning new skills such as partitioning and two-step worded problems. The boys have challenged themselves and learnt how to work more independently. In the summer term we have focused on fractions and place value in preparation for Year 2. Over the year we have enjoyed learning through practical activities. We have used shapes, maths games, made clocks and even opened our own shops. Maths is best learnt through hands on, fun activities! The boys are applying their own knowledge and we are proud of their efforts and how far they have come.









Science

Science in Year 1 has been hands on and eventful! Our first topic was on 'Our Senses'. We thought about how we interact with the world around us. We enjoyed a tasting experiment including lemon, salt and even chocolate! The boys built up their scientific vocabulary when learning about different habitats. We made homes for pets and it was interesting how everyone's was a little bit different!

We have enjoyed a range of experiments including freezing and melting ice, exploring

waterproof materials and looking at the properties of solids and liquids. In the summer term we grew our own sunflowers - with some people's sunflowers now as tall as them! We looked at seeds within different fruits and vegetables. We ended the term looking at farms and farm animals. We have learnt how to make predictions and write up our conclusions using scientific vocabulary.

Year 2

This term in Year 2 has been very busy!

From Growing our own plants, performing an assembly all about bees and racing like an athlete in sports day.

Science

Have you ever wondered what home-grown foods might taste like? In Science this term, we have grown and nurtured our own plants, understood how food chains work, and learnt that energy from the Sun is passed through each link in a food chain.










Literacy






Once the exams finished, we kicked started the Leavers' Programme with a Maths trip to Bletchley Park. There we explored the role of mathematics during World War 2 and how understanding and cracking codes and ciphers was the backbone of stopping the axis powers. Once back in school the boys were able to put their new learning into practice, having the



opportunity to crack some codes as well as learning about the important people involved at Bletchley Park.

Across the school, we have had an outstanding set of results in Maths this year with the boys making excellent progress since September – we are proud of each and every single one. It is our aim to ensure that every boy not only 'gets' Maths but exceeds their own expectations.

We are all very much looking forward to continuing with our success in September.





Mathematical Challenges

One of our strengths at St. Anthony's is our commitment to give all our boys an opportunity to engage in problem-solving challenges. This term was no exception! Year 7 and 8, along with a few boys from Year 4, 5 and 6 took part in the Junior Mathematical Challenge (JMC). The results were the best the school has had in the past few years with thirteen boys invited to participate in the prestigious Junior Kangaroo Round. We also had our first pupil in Year 4 to gain a Silver Certificate: Rufus Head. A huge congratulations to all the boys who participated.

Our boys in Year 2 – 4 also had an opportunity to sit the First Mathematical Challenge 2022 in June.


Science


This has been an exciting term in the Science Department from Reception to Year 8.

For the first time in the faculty's history, we began the launch of Computer Science as a unit of work open to Year 7 and 8 students in the final half of the Summer term. Boys in these year groups have been working on how to programme simple and complex functions through the computing language of Python. Boys in Year 8 have had the opportunity to use the fast and versatile microcontroller and Raspberry Pi, to construct robotic buggies that they could control through computer coding.


Getting to grips with new and challenging units of work such as Computer Science, is a common feature of Science learning in both the Junior and Senior House. We have been thrilled to see boys in Reception become well-versed in using simple scientific language to describe the features and properties of objects and materials. From Year 1 through to Year 2, the development of scientific language has been remarkable. Not only do the boys have the knowledge to conduct impressive investigative experiments, but they can also explain the concepts underpinning them.

In keeping with our growing understanding of the changing world around us, Year 3 have been growing wonderful plant organisms and learning about their benefit to the environment. Mini beasts have been searched for and discovered on









the Heath in Year 4 as part of their learning on Living Things! Year 5's work on life cycles of living things has seen them learning about creatures far and near. The boys have been very mature in their approach to the learning and judging by the work they have produced, they have grasped the topic very well.

Year 6's investigation of food groups and the energy content of food samples has been a highlight of the year. Seeing the boys develop their bunsen burner practice and skilled usage of a variety of chemicals has been a privilege.

This time of year always provokes a mixture of emotions. On one hand we are excited for the next chapter of Science learning that our Year 8s and some Year 6s will be embarking upon at senior school. On the other hand, it is always tough saying goodbye to students moving on from St Anthony's. What we can say is that every pupil has developed their Science learning and understanding over the course of this year, and that is a point worth celebrating!

Humanities

This has been a great term for Year 6 who have worked hard throughout this term.

In Geography, they have completed a Location Knowledge and OS maps module which is an excellent link to the other themes they will study next year, such as Rivers & Coasts. This has involved looking at the local area of Hampstead,

investigating the names and sources of local streets. They also very much enjoyed looking at an OS map of Hampstead together as a class, looking at different symbols and linking this to the Population & Settlement module. For example, how did Hampstead move from a village settlement to becoming part of London? In History, they have very much enjoyed studying War of the Roses, prior to the Making of the UK course in Year 7. We have been impressed by their

grasp of the complicated family tree between the Houses of Lancaster and York and critically evaluating the reigns of various monarchs. Their work in RE has also been impressed, investigating the different journeys of St Paul.

In Year 7, pupils completed their excellent enrichment projects in RE and we were so impressed by their commitment to these projects, trying digital literacy to an enriched understanding of RE. They have also made excellent headway with the Common Entrance Course. In History, they have enjoyed studying the reign of Elizabeth I, particularly during our lessons on The Spanish Armada and the many different images of Elizabeth I. We are sure they will enjoy the Stuarts,

next year. In Geography, great progress has been made with their coursework and they have demonstrated a high level of data analysis and evaluation. They have been clearly organised and meticulous with this work.



We are also very proud of our Year 8 pupils who have worked so hard for their Common Entrance exams and showed commitment to their revision, leading up to the exams. As mentioned to Year 8, they are fully prepared for the next stage of their school career and we are sure they will have a wonderful time at their new schools. Undoubtedly, the skills, experience, knowledge and friendships they have made at St Anthony's will be with them for a lifetime.





Year 4's toy cars showed great imagination and decoration among students, alongside a finishing of their cubist instruments from last term, both showing a great degree of skills in construction and design.





Cyanotypes




Henry Moore drawing Filippo

Drama


I have been impressed with the input from students over the last couple of terms regarding their end-of-year productions.

Digital Literacy





Digital Literacy is something that we at St Anthony's define as 'being able to decisively and knowingly choose when technology is useful to completing a task.' If children are to be deemed 'digitally literate' then they should be able to explain cogently why and how digital technologies are useful or obstructive in different learning contexts.


With this in mind, our ICT syllabus has revolved around the principle of greater preparing the

boys to use technology safely and responsibly, especially in this digital world. From Reception to Year 8, boys have been taught to become digitally literate not only in ICT lessons but in subject-specific lessons as well. With the eight components of digital literacy as the guiding principle, boys have the opportunity to use the school iPads, laptops and Surface Gos (in Years 6-8).









This term, we have seen excellent examples of iPads being used for improving cursive handwriting. Year 1 have been using the iPads to learn about creating media through digital painting and writing. In Year 2, boys have explored uses of IT in the world around us during their work on Computing Systems and Networks. Stop-frame/motion animation has been a wonderful way for Year 3 to learn more about Creating Media on digital devices.

Over in the Senior House, boys have covered a whole host of exciting topics including 'Video Editing', 'Data Information', 'Web Page Creation', 'Programming' and an 'Introduction to Python Programming.' As we look ahead to the next academic year, it is important to celebrate and reflect upon all of the good work that has been accomplished in ICT this year!


